This is the School's introductory European Union course. It requires no previous knowledge, and may be taken as the first of four courses in the Minor on the European Union. The focus is on the EU's history and institutions, and the Single European Market in particular.

Objective

This course provides an introduction to the political and economic system of the European Union. It is designed to provide students with tools and frameworks for analysing the impact of the current process of closer economic integration and the constitutional development of the European Union. The course covers the evolution of European integration up to and including the current constitutional convention. It provides an introduction to the institutions of the EU and the decision making processes, including a 'firms-eye' perspective on European integration. The core theme is the development of the internal market in Europe: the completion of the Single European Market. Associated topics include Economic and Monetary Union, EU economic and company regulation, regulation of working time, and lobbying. The course is designed as a complete stand-alone course, but may be complemented by further courses that focus on EU policies, lobbying in the EU and the European Economic Area/Enlargement/Global Politics.

Course outline

Topics covered include: The EU political and economic system, the history of the EU, the European institutions (the Council of Ministers, the Commission, the Court of Justice, the European Parliament) and decision making procedures; the Single European Market and related market regulation (competition policy, company rules, and social and environment policies); Economic and Monetary Union; as well as current developments in constitutional, institutional and treaty reform (the Convention and Intergovernmental Conferences). The course also introduces the relationship between the EU and EFTA countries and the operation of the European Economic Area, with some focus on Norway and the implications of EU developments for Norwegian business and industry.
