The course gives an introduction to perspectives and theories that are helpful in order to analyse and understand the business institutions and the development of the modern economy.

Learning outcome

By applying both theoretical and historical perspectives to the rise and development of the modern economy, this course introduces students to frameworks of interpretation highlighting broad and constituting developments of the modern economy. The course aim at both introducing basic concepts for understanding business studies and economics at the same time as placing these concepts in the historical setting where they once emerged. Central elements of economic theory are introduced and discussed in relationship with the development of the economy over time.
